Active Supervision



Active supervision is more intentional and preventative than what we typically think of when we talk about supervision. Head Start has been implementing active supervision in their programs and has determined six components needed to make it work.

Set up the environment

o Arrange your environment for good visual supervision. Move shelves if needed to make sure you can see over them. Look for spaces that can't be supervised easily and either change the arrangement or make sure a staff person is assigned to supervise that area.

Position staff

o Be intentional about where you and your coworkers place yourself in your setting. If you work alone, make sure you are positioned so you can supervise the children easily. This goes for outside time also; staff should position themselves in different areas of the playground.

Scan and count

o As you are interacting with children, look around. Also, count the number of children in your care frequently. You should always know how many children you have even with all the arrivals and departures. Keeping a list of the children you currently have is very important, this list can be used when transitioning from one space to another. Instead of just counting heads, use your list to look for each child as you say their name and check them off the list.

Listen

o Child care environments are noisy but it's still important to listen carefully. Using your listening skills can help you identify trouble brewing and step in to prevent it. Sometimes the lack of sound can be an indicator that something is up too. When that group of children in the block area suddenly become quiet, it might be a good time to go over and see what's going on.

Anticipate children's behavior

o Since you know your children so well, use this knowledge to anticipate when they may need some help or guidance. For example, knowing that when a child in your care, starts to wander around, he or she typically disrupts other children as they are playing because he or she doesn't know how to join a group very well. Because you know this, you are able to anticipate his or her need and help him or her join a group successfully.

Engage and redirect

o Interacting with children as they are playing is another part of supervision. This allows you to observe their interests and needs which aids in supervision by being able to plan experiences which keep children engaged. It also helps so you can easily step in and redirect a child who may need some guidance.

Active supervision builds on itself, progressing from the basics of arranging the room all the way to interacting with children. Using this form of supervision ensures children are safe, engaged and learning.

This video-based, instructor-led course teaches adult, child and infant CPR, AED use, and how to relieve choking. This course teaches skills with AHA's practice-while-watching technique, which allows instructors to observe the students and provide feedback.

How to Conduct a Proper Name/Face Check

- Gather the children in one area (e.g., on one side of a low bookshelf in the classroom, or from the tile floor to the carpet if you have both in your classroom. On the playground, gather them away from the fence and have them come and touch the fence when you call their name.)
- Ask them to "freeze." (Some will and some won't, but everyone age 31/2 & older should)
- Tell them, "When I say your name, say 'here' and come see me."
- Call out name.
- Look at child's face.
- Have him stand or sit in the designated area.
- Mark his name with a dot or highlight.
- When complete, make sure all names are highlighted and all kids are in the designated area.
- Count the kids and count the names.
- Ensure that all children are accounted for and numbers match.
- Obviously if you call out a name and cannot find the child you have to take immediate action to locate him!



CPR Class Policy

CPR classes sponsored by the City of Sioux Falls Health Department through Sanford CHILD Services are provided free of charge to Sioux Falls City registered family day care providers and their helpers. Registration for CPR classes is limited to 9 people per class. To help ensure CPR education is available throughout the year to Sioux Falls City registered family day care providers, the following policy exists:

Class registration is limited to Sioux Falls city registered family day care providers and their helpers. Sioux Falls City registered family day care providers, and their helpers, receive one free CPR class per year.

CPR Cancellation Policy

Cancellation of CPR class registration needs to be made 24 hours prior to the start of the CPR class.

If notice of cancellation is not received 24 hours prior to the CPR class, the registrant will have used up his/her free CPR class for the year. A payment of \$20 will be needed to enroll in another City of Sioux Falls Health Department sponsored CPR class.
